

Multi-champion Daniel Dias will participate in the CPB gallery launch at the eMuseum of Sport: 'Not having arms does not define me, what defines me is the strength I have inside myself'

Virtual event on the National Day of Struggle for People with Disabilities includes other stars, on a team that has already earned 40 medals in the Paralympic Games

The eMuseum of Sport and the Brazilian Paralympic Committee (CPB) will celebrate the National Day of Struggle for People with Disabilities on this Monday (September 21st), with the launch of CPB's [3D gallery](#), forming a team of paralympic stars. The virtual event will be transmitted live on the eMuseum's Facebook and YouTube pages, beginning at 11:00. The free exhibit will cover competitions and major victories of Brazilian athletes since the Rio 2016 Paralympic Games.

The eMuseum and the CPB will bring together stars from Brazilian sport, such as the multi-champion Daniel Dias. A phenomenon in the pool, the athlete is the most successful male medalist of world paralympic swimming, with the incredible mark of 24 medals earned – 14 gold, seven silver, and three bronze. Other Paralympic Games stars will participate in the launch, such as Yohansson Nascimento, who has one gold medal, three silver and two bronze; and swimmer Edênia Garcia, who has two silver medals and one bronze, as well as Rayanne Soares, world champion and vice-champion in Athletics.

The event will also include two artistic presentations: dancing on wheels, from a gym that is affiliated with the Brazilian Wheelchair Dancing Confederation, and a show by musician Johnatha Bastos, a guitarist who plays with his feet and participated in the Rio 2016 Games closing ceremony.

"The feeling of seeing my name in the Brazilian Paralympic Committee Gallery is incredible. I have a career that has been in construction for Years, and it is very gratifying to receive this recognition and be able to help the movement", celebrates Daniel Dias: "sport showed me what we are capable of, it showed me I should not set limits for my life. It doesn't matter if I have arms or not, that does not define me. What defines me is what I have inside myself. And what I have inside myself is a whole lot of strength."

Created to eternalize the memory of sport and its athletes, the eMuseum provides an innovative experience by offering, free of charge, an immersive tour on a 3D platform. In the Brazilian Paralympic Committee gallery, visitors will have entirely accessible content at their disposal, available in Brazilian sign language and as an audio description. To share the history of our stars abroad, the collection will also be available in English.

Sponsored by Enel Distribuição Rio, alongside Rio's Office of Sport, Leisure, and Youth, thanks to the state government's Sport Incentive Law, the eMuseum already has seven galleries: Brazilian Basketball Confederation, Brazilian Table Tennis Confederation, Brazilian Canoeing Confederation, Military Sport, Brazilian Master Sports Committee, International Sports Museum, and Enel Distribuição Rio. The portal also contains a collaborative 2D section, where the public can create their own collections, posting photos and videos that show their history in sport.
